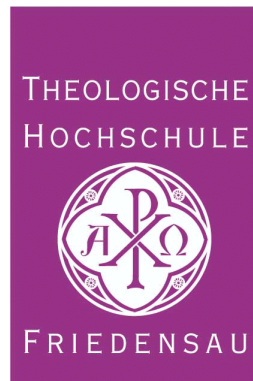

The executive committee and the senate of Friedensau Adventist University appointed a committee to devise a spiritual master plan in March, 2007. Since then the following members have been meeting:

At the end of October 2007 the group informed the executive committee of its progress. One year later the first draft of the SPIRITUAL MASTER PLAN (SMP) was presented on campus.

With a foundation of basic spiritual thoughts, we agreed on goals for the spiritual master plan that should lead to concrete measures. Some measures that have not yet been implemented will become tangible and measurable as the plan is put into practice. This will remain a continuing goal for our committee.

We do not consider the SMP as a final document, but rather see it as the beginning of an active and dynamic dialogue among students, lecturers, and in various committees of the university. This will lead to changes in the current SMP and it is our wish that the process of change and dialogue will continue. The changing and developing SMP will thus offer a dialogue that will enrich spiritual life on campus.

I. Introduction

One of the most important duties of society is to accompany young people as they grow into competent and mature citizens. This includes their academic qualification. In a time of fast-changing values or a loss of values as lamented by some, with all the consequences for society, the connection between education and spiritual values orientation constitutes the pre-requisite as well as the opportunity for this task to succeed. A Christian Adventist university will be characterized by these three aspects:

- a) The institution's academic qualification and spiritual orientation are organically connected;
- b) Freedom of research and teaching characterizes the university;
- c) The holistic personal development and education of students and all employees alike forms a central part of the profile of our Christian Adventist university.

The following **SPIRITUAL MASTER PLAN** (SMP) contributes to the accomplishment of this task. We would like to emphasize that this marks the beginning of a continuing development and not an unchangeable status.

The following draft presents the basic ideas of the SMP, based on a number of principles. These basics lead to the targeted goals. In order to reach these goals, certain measures and actions are stated and responsible people listed. The actual time frame for the implementation of the plan has not been detailed. An evaluation and operationalization in the process of implementation will show whether the goals and actions have been attained.

II. Basic Thoughts

Preamble and Principles

To find God, to be Human, to Empower for Service Living and Studying at an Adventist University

In the Friedensau community (students, lecturers, employees, SDA church) we support each other in

<i>Faith</i>	(finding faith in God)
<i>Living</i>	(being authentic) and
<i>Service</i>	(taking on responsibility for the world)

A. Spiritual Foundations

To find God, to be human, to empower for service: This takes place as we ...

1. (*Faith*) ...encourage each other in the university community to discover, nurture, and deepen a dynamic relationship with God. We place spiritual matters in context and support a spiritual atmosphere in all areas of the university – in research and teaching, in service areas and spiritual activities as well as free-time activities. In this way we live and demonstrate the relevance of a dynamic relationship with God.
2. (*Living*) ...as a university community, encourage each other to build valuable and strong relationships with the people in the community, in the nursing home and the neighbouring communities. Serious contemplation about the meaning of life as well as joyful celebration together are part of this process, as well as discovering others and ourselves.
3. (*Service*) ... empower each other to take on responsibility for each other and those in need; as we offer the opportunity for the university community to develop leadership and service qualities by active involvement on the local, regional, and global level; as we teach and demonstrate responsibility for creation.

B. Spiritual Atmosphere

1. A spiritual atmosphere develops when people live a life that is God-centered and let biblical principles govern their lives. For this reason, we recommend reading God's word regularly and praying – alone or in groups.
2. In Friedensau, Christian values should influence every area of life and work. The university and church, nursing home and community are connected; institutions and citizens interact in many ways. Therefore, our goal is to treat each other with love and respect. We consider and respect the value and dignity of all people as God's creation. Some of our basic values include Christian time management, as reflected in the observance of the Sabbath and also ecological orientation, based on Christian stewardship. Our orientation towards Christ's return gives our entire Christian life a clear perspective.
3. Church services, worships, small groups, spiritual highlights during the year, and other spiritual moments offer ample opportunity for spiritual communion. For this reason, we

encourage participation and active involvement, while respecting personal responsibility and the voluntary nature of such events. We offer help in the form of information, spiritual guidance, mentoring, and counselling.

C. Adventist Identity

1. Friedensau Adventist University has a Christian, Protestant free church, Adventist profile. It is part of the world-wide Adventist church and its educational institutions. The Adventist identity of the university is our “interpretation” of what we consider discipleship and Christian convictions. The heritage of the Reformation, the Advent movement and its pioneers, Friedensau’s history of over 100 years, and God’s guidance with the university represent a valuable asset for us and a spiritual obligation.
2. This identity becomes apparent in our consistent search for God’s commission in our time, in our commitment to the Bible, and appreciation of Adventist history, teaching, and practice.
3. For us, Adventist identity is not a closed system, but a liberating relationship with Jesus Christ. It includes self-confidence in regards to our convictions as well as humility and respect for other Christians and non-Christians and the willingness to cooperate with them. As an Adventist university, we sensitively invite students and employees that belong to a different or no denomination to get to know the Christian faith, God, and the Adventist church.

D. Missionary Development

1. (*Unity*) The spiritual focus of Friedensau Adventist University lies in a positive, life-affirming acceptance of salvation through Jesus Christ. This joyful message of Jesus is passed on in the lives of employees and students alike in regional and international projects. The reformatory principles of “sola scriptura”, “solo Christo”, “sola gratia”, and “sola fide” are put into practice in daily life.
2. (*Diversity*) In Friedensau, people of various character come together. This diversity can be seen in cultural aspects, language, habits, and forms of piety. We consider this an enrichment of campus life and desire to not only accept diversity, but also to regard it as an opportunity and promote it.
3. (*Example*) We encourage each other to attend the various spiritual events. Highly attractive events, proactive invitations, and the example of teachers and employees promote spiritual life at the university. Adventist staff has an important exemplary function to fulfill in regards to main aspects of Adventist beliefs and Christian lifestyle.

In completing the thoughts regarding the foundations of our spiritual master plan, we would like to offer a thought of E.G. White’s: (The Acts of the Apostles, p. 13)

“Jeder Mensch, in dessen Herz Christus wohnt, jeder, der seine Liebe der Welt zeigen will, ist Gottes Mitarbeiter zum Segen der Menschheit. Er empfängt vom Heiland Gnade, um sie mit andern zu teilen, und von seinem ganzen Wesen fließt eine Flut geistlichen Lebens.”

III. Goals

A. Spiritual Foundations
